

JAMES SUFFERED HORRENDOUS INJURIES

James was taken to a local vet in October 2016 in an appalling state by a kind passerby who found him by the roadside. He had terrible injuries to his head and neck. The vet who treated him felt that these had been caused by fire or some sort of chemical and was almost certainly deliberate. He had been living as a stray, was underweight and un-neutered. He is estimated to be about 4 years old. After treatment James came to the cattery in November and since

then has been gently nursed back to health. By January James was ready for rehoming but overlooked because of his appearance

Julia Laidlaw and her husband had sadly lost their beloved 17 year old cat in December 2016 and were thinking of another cat and James needed a home. They decided he was perfect for them and adopted him on 20th January. Since then James has learned how to go in and out of a catflap encouraged by a few treats and made himself fully at home. Julia says 'Despite his terrible experiences he is the sweetest natured cat - he settled very quickly and is an absolute gentleman. He is also loving and so grateful for regular meals, a safe home and a lap to sit on!

BARRY, CHARLIE AND JAMES are just 3 of the animals that needed long-term love and care during 2016/17 that went on to find loving and caring new homes.

The number of animals coming into the branch in need of maximum help and veterinary care is sadly on the increase. We felt it was important to re-iterate here that, despite rumours and bad press the RSPCA DOES NOT put a healthy animal to sleep unless it's on the advice of a vet and sometimes, even then, we think twice about it before acting.

At the beginning of 2017 we want to say a very BIG THANK YOU to EVERYONE who has taken one of our beautiful animals and given them a new chance of life. We also say a VERY BIG THANK YOU to everyone that contributes to the branch be it financially through donations, membership, donations of goods for the cattery and the shop, or just by giving some of their time to help us.


WHY DO WE HAVE SUCH APPALLING CRUELTY?

In this newsletter we have been highlighting the problem of animal suffering, treatment, care, love and adoption. Sadly the situation with HORSES does not get any better and we make no apologies for enclosing this report from our Branch Support Specialist Becky Kenny with regard to the appalling situation in Kent which is one of the worst areas in the country.

SOME PHOTOS MIGHT CAUSE DISTRESS but we hope you will understand why they have been included here. These poor animals have been found ON OUR PATCH and our LOCAL INSPECTORS are faced with heartbreaking and distressing situations that have to be dealt with on an almost daily basis

In recent years we have seen a massive increase in the number of calls relating to horses, with Kent being a particular hotspot. In the period November to February alone, 13 horses were found dead and a further 25 found dying - sadly 6 of these were too ill to save and had to be put to sleep, but we did manage to save and rehabilitate 19 of these poor animals. In the same period over 250 other complaints were dealt with regarding horses. A hotspot for "dumping" has been Wateringbury and more recently we are seeing an increase in Kingshill.

Two of these were "Woody" and "Buzz". They were found in Wateringbury. Buzz was estimated at 5 months old and was found in someone's garden with one of the worst wounds on his leg that the vet and Inspector had seen - down to the bone. Woody was nearby in a copse of woods with a less severe, but still very nasty large chest wound. It was uncertain if Buzz's wound would heal, but he had such spirit it was decided we would try. It took the Inspector, vet and 2 PCSOs from the local police to physically lift him down some stairs and get him safely to the horsebox.

5 months later and Woody has made a full recovery and is currently looking for his forever home. Buzz's wound was healing well, but had a bit of a setback and required a second surgery however he has now nearly completely healed and become a very cheeky chap and will be looking for a home soon!

We currently have 55 horses in private boarding in Kent alone; many of which are looking for homes and others still rehabilitating.

If anyone ever sees or suspects cruelty please get in touch with us or the Inspectorate. We might just be able to prevent another shocking incident like those featured here.

The RSPCA gets a lot of criticism in the press and media. We want to say a big thank you to our team of Inspectors who have to deal with atrocious situations like these daily. They are truly dedicated and caring people.
