NEWS FROM OUR SHOP

The shop in Wheeler Street, Maidstone was established over 35 years ago in a building that was left to the Maidstone & Tunbridge Wells Branch by a benefactor. The funds raised are the main source of finance for the Headcorn

cattery and for helping needy pet owners in the area with vet's fees.

The shop is managed by Tony and Sue Loy supported by their volunteers Wendy, Maria, Sarah, Trudie, Karen, Julie and Angela. They open up Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday from 10am to 3pm and work extremely hard sorting and presenting all kinds of donated items. Clothes and shoes being the most donated items followed by toys, puzzles, games, bric-a-brac, household items, books, CDs, DVDs and Christmas decorations.

The condition of many items will mean that they will be difficult to sell so there are several established routes to create income from resale with brokers and auctions. Other items such as books, metal and textiles will go for recycling. Despite notices asking that only clean and saleable donations are brought to the shop and not left out of hours a huge amount of broken, dirty and unsaleable items are dumped and then have to be disposed of. This means that a large wheelie bin of totally unusable junk from amongst these donations is sent to landfill every week at considerable cost to the branch. This is a problem affecting all charity shops as it has become more and more difficult to access council tips
